

To continue our articles featuring members of the governing body, we recently caught up with our new Co-Opted governor, Clair Brown

Thanks Clair for joining us for our Spotlight article. Let's begin with hearing a bit about yourself and your professional background:

I love the outdoors and being outside so it's no surprise that I trained in Farm Management at an Agricultural College. Before having my children I worked as an administrator including spending many years working for the NSPCC children's charity. I have also spent time working in church with children and youth and as part of church leadership.

What attracted you to become a governor at St Ann's Heath?

I have had 2 children go through the school. Both of them had a wonderful experience there, so I was pleased to have the opportunity to support the school in continuing to be the best it can by becoming a governor.

What are your main responsibilities as a co-opted Governor?


Welcome to our Spring 2 Reading Newsletter!
