Key knowledge

- ✓ R.M.S Titanic was built by the White Star Line and was the world's largest passenger liner at the time.
- ✓ J. Bruce Ismay owned White Star Line and therefore was the owner of the Titanic.
- ✓ Construction of the Titanic started on 31st March 1909 at the Harland and Wolff Shipyard in Belfast. It took
- ✓ over 3 years to build.
- ✓ The maiden voyage began on 10th April 1912.
- ✓ The Titanic sailed from Southampton, heading for New York City.
- ✓ E.J Smith was the Captain of the ship on its maiden voyage.
- ✓ There were three classes of people on board the RMS Titanic. First, second and third class.
- ✓ Titanic actually carried more lifeboats than she needed to by law.
- ✓ 14th April 1912— The Titanic collided with an iceberg whist in the Atlantic Ocean.
- ✓ 15th April 1912—The Titanic sank, killing 1506 passengers and crew. 705 people survived.
- ✓ 1985—The wreck of the Titanic was discovered at the bottom of the ocean.
- ✓ There were three different classes of passengers:
 - First Class were the richest passengers and they enjoyed the most luxurious facilities.
 - Second Class passengers stayed in cabins that were not as luxurious as first class.
 - Third class passengers slept in bunk beds and had much smaller cabins.

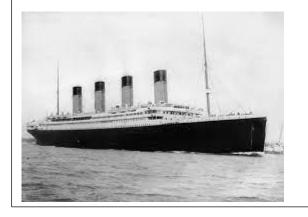

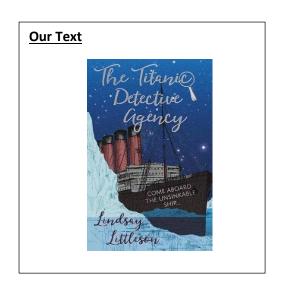

Timeline of Events			
1908-1909	Work begins on White Star Line's newest steam ship, the Titanic. It is the		
	largest steam ship ever made and is built in Belfast, Ireland.		
April 10 th 1909	Passengers arrive in Southampton and the Titanic sets off on her maiden		
	voyage at midday.		
April 12-13 th 1909	The Titanic sails through calm waters towards New York.		
April 14 th	The lookout spots an iceberg dead ahead. The Titanic tries to steer round it		
11.40pm	and is hit on the right-hand side.		
April 14 th	Water pours in and rises extremely quickly in the front part of the ship		
11.50pm			
April 15 th	The captain is told the ship can only stay afloat for a couple of hours. He gives		
12.00am	the order to call for help over the radio		
April 15 th	Orders are given to uncover the lifeboats and passengers and crew get ready		
12.05am	on deck. There is only room for half of the people on board in the lifeboats		
April 15 th	Lifeboats are loaded with women and children first. Another ship, The		
12.25am	Carpathia, picks up the distress call about 58 miles away and sails as quickly		
	as possible to rescue passengers.		
April 15 th	The last lifeboat is lowered into the water. Over 1500 people remain		
2.05am	stranded on the ship. Titanic's deck become steeper and the rear of the ship		
	breaks off.		
April 15 th	The remaining ship levels out for a few moments before slowly filling with		
2.20am	more water. The water pulls the ship back high into the air before pulling it		
	under. Remaining passengers are stranded in the icy waters; most of them		
	are unable to be saved.		
April 15 th	The Carpathia leaves the remaining wreckage and make its way to New Work.		
8.50am	She manages to save 705 passengers and crew.
